# Homeless & Highly Mobile Students

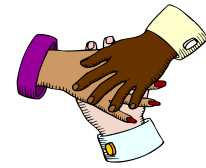
*Homeless students live in any of the situations listed below:*

- Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- Children and youth who are sharing the housing of others
- Children and youth living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of adequate alternative accommodations
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Awaiting foster care placement
- Living in a public or private place not designed for humans to live
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, etc.
- Migratory children living in any of the above circumstances



***Under the McKinney-Vento Act, children in homeless situations have the right to:***

- Enroll in school immediately
- Go to school, no matter where they live or how long they have lived there
- Attend either the local school or the school of origin, if this is in their best interest; the school of origin is the school the child attended when she/he was permanently housed or the school in which the child was last enrolled
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin
- Participate fully in school activities
- Have access to the same programs and services that are available to all other students including transportation and supplemental educational services



***Services provided to students and families:***

- Immediate school placement and assistance with registration
- Records retrieval from previous school
- Initial English Language Learners and Special Education screening
- Inform parents and students about school attendance policies
- Monitor student progress
- School uniform
- School supplies, materials and books
- Help families and schools build a strong relationship
- Refer families to community services
